

Fire safety and Coronavirus: your lockdown to-do list

Public health advice to stay at home during the Coronavirus pandemic means that most of us will be spending more time at home in the coming months.

If you want to make sure your home is as safe from fire risks as possible, go through the points below while looking around your home.

Tick any items you need to consider or carry out. You can download the list at the end to keep as a reminder.

1. Smoking and vaping

Are there smokers living in your home? Or if you have essential visitors, such as carers – do they smoke? When people are restricted to their home, they may find themselves smoking more often.

Things to check: Check for near-misses you might not have spotted - scorch or burn marks on floors, clothing or bedding Check that any matches or lighters are kept out of reach of children Check that any e-liquids are out of reach of children and pets Things to do: Smoke in the garden if you have one Empty all ashtrays carefully and never into a waste bin that could catch fire Place ashtrays in every room you smoke in If you're smoking on your balcony dispose of it safely. Thrown cigarette butts can be blown onto other balconies and start fires Things you might choose to buy: Buy deep, heavy ashtrays that are less likely to tip over If you buy any e-cigarette devices buy them from a reputable seller

2. Cooking

With restaurants and bars closed, you may find that you're doing more cooking at home. And with children home from school, you might have more distractions to deal with.

Head into your kitchen and look around. Is there anything that could catch fire near the hobs?

Thir	ngs to check:
	Check for scorched tea towels or worktops in the kitchen
	Check your toaster isn't placed under kitchen cabinets or close to anything that can catch fire
	Check that your oven, hob, cooker hood and grill are clean and in good working order
	If you have a barbeque, make sure it stays outside, that it's positioned on level ground and kept well away from anything that may catch fire
Thir	ngs to do:
	Clear away anything that may fall on the cooker and catch fire
	If you're called away from cooking, make sure you turn the hobs and grill off first
	Clean your oven, cooker hood and grill of fat and grease
	Clear the crumbs from the toaster as these can cause a build-up and catch fire
	Don't be tempted to use a barbeque on a balcony
Thir	ngs you might choose to buy:
	Buy a heat alarm and test it monthly - you can order these online
	Buy a CO alarm for your kitchen if you have a gas or solid fuel cooker or boiler in the room
3.	Candles, incense and naked flames
	nding more time at home might mean that you want to make it cosy with candles and incense, these can be a fire risk.
Wall	k around your home and see if you can spot any candles, incense or naked flames.
Thir	ngs to check:
	Check that candles, incense and oil burners are held firmly in heat resistant holders and placed on a stable surface
\Box	Check that these items are out of reach of children and pets

	Check that these items are kept away from materials that may catch fire, such as curtains, furnishings or clothes			
	Candles are naked flames - check that candles are a safe distance away from anyone who uses emollient creams, as these are flammable			
Thir	Things to do:			
	Replace your candles with 'flameless' candles (also known as battery-operated or LED candles)			
	Move incense and candles away from anything that could catch fire			
	Place candles, incense and oil burners in heat resistant holders and place these on a stable surface			
	Move candles out of reach of children and pets			
Thir	ngs you might choose to buy:			
	Flameless LED candles			
	Heat resistant candle holders			
4.	Heating			
If you're heating your home for longer than you usually do, you may be worried about your heating bills.				
If tha	at's the case you can get advice from GOV.UK Try not to heat your home in an unsafe way.			
Thir	ngs to check:			
	Check that any portable heaters are kept clear of furniture and away from bedclothes and curtains			
	Check that portable heaters are kept at least one metre away from any person			
Thir	ngs to do:			
	Move portable heaters away from anything that can catch fire			
	Move portable heaters a safe distance away from anyone in the room			
	Remove any clothes drying on portable heaters			
Things you might choose to buy:				

5. Fireplaces, open fires and log burners

Open fires can provide some much needed heating to your home but can be a fire risk even when not in use.

Thi	Things to check:		
	Check for any flammable items near your fireplace or log burner		
	Check that your chimney and flue is clean and well maintained		
	Check that any logs are stored away from solid fuel burners such as the fireplace		
Thi	ngs to do:		
	Don't light a fire in your fireplace if you haven't been able to get your chimney and flue cleaned (once a year, or twice if you're burning logs)		
	Remove any clothes drying by your fireplace		
Thi	ngs you might choose to buy:		
	Buy a fireguard to protect against flying sparks and hot embers		
	Carbon monoxide alarm (for every room containing a gas appliance, fuel burner or paraffin heater)		
Witl	Electrics h more people working from home, and children at home using tablets and games consoles for ger, you might struggle to find a spare plug socket or a genuine charger to use.		
	re a good look around your home at the plug sockets, chargers and any wiring you can see, and cour <u>Electrics</u> page.		
Thi	ngs to check:		
	Check that none of the electrical sockets in your home are overloaded		
	Check that your white goods (such as your dishwasher or tumble dryer) are properly registered and haven't been recalled		
	Check that all your appliances have a British or European safety mark		
	Check that your electrics are clean and in good working order		
	Check for any loose or dangerous wiring around your home (look out for scorch marks, flickering		

lights, hot plugs and sockets, fuses that blow or circuit-breakers that trip for no obvious reason)

Things to do:		
	Throw out any chargers that either didn't come with the device or that are not genuine replacements	
	Empty the fluff from your tumble dryer following the manufacturer's instructions	
Thir	ngs you might choose to buy:	
	Genuine replacement charger	
	Fused 'in-line' adaptors – these are the extension cables that have the sockets in a line, not on a cube	
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7.	Alarms	
It's always better to prevent a fire from happening, but fitting alarms will give an early warning in the event of a fire and allow you vital time to escape.		
That's even more important if you are feeling unwell - when you might be less able to react or escape from a fire.		
Thir	ngs to check:	
	Check you have working smoke alarms	
Thir	ngs to do:	
	Test all your smoke alarms now	
	Put a reminder in your calendar to regularly check your smoke alarms	
	Ask your telecare provider (if you have one) to link your telecare system to your smoke alarms	
Thir	ngs you might choose to buy:	
	Additional smoke alarms to put in other rooms	
	A heat alarm for the kitchen – the alarm will sound if an increase in heat is detected, but not if you burn the toast	

8. Escape Routes

You might have more than your typical amount of groceries, toilet paper, nappies etc in your home, which could be blocking your escape.

Think about how you would leave your home if there was a fire. Consider your route in the middle of the night, and how it might be different during the day if you're all in different parts of your home.

Things to check:		
	Check everyone in the home knows what to do in an emergency	
	Check everyone knows where the door keys are kept overnight	
	Check that all ground and first floor windows can be opened	
	Check that all the ways in and out of your home are kept clear of anything that may slow down or block your escape	
Thir	ngs to do:	
	Clear your escape routes of any obstacles	
	Make an escape plan and practise it with your household	
9.	Bedtime check	
If someone in your household is self-isolating and is now sleeping in a different room, make sure you've adapted your bedtime routine accordingly.		
	y fires happen at night, when most people are sleeping. You can further reduce the risk in your see by carrying out some simple checks before you go to bed.	
Thir	ngs to check:	
	Check all electrical items are turned off before you go to bed, unless they're designed to be left on.	
	Check that your washing machine, tumble dryer and dishwasher aren't left on overnight	
Thir	ngs to do:	
	Place the keys for all external doors where everyone can get to them	
	Close all the doors in your home before you to go bed
